Dr. Kurt Lindermann's Notes Found

London — While cleaning out his attic, Mr. M. Kyle Falconer made an astonishing discovery; Dr. Kurt Lindermann's notes. The very notes he made while studying the runes that were found by the Murcheson Expedition.

Statuettes of stone were discovered by Sir William Murcheson, with curious carvings on them. Although no one has been able to decipher them, apparently Dr. Lindermann was very close. The cause of this illness was never discovered.
